JIM DUROCHER: Yeah basically the same thing, you know. I would like to see the implementation of those rights that are there already. You know, let's, let's convince our leaders to, you know, to go, to take ownership of those rights, you know. We, they're there already and what we need to do is we need to go back to the communities. We need to convince, you know, the communities that we're, you know, we're, we're, we're going to, we're going to go and get, get our rights and exercise those rights and take ownership of them. That's what we need to do and I, and I also hope very sincerely that, you know, some of our young people, you know, for example, that are going to University, going to school and that sort of thing. You know, I, I hope that many more will go, will, will, will do that. But, but, you know, let's not forget our traditional, you know, our traditions, our traditional way of life. You know, we need to, we need to keep, keep that. Otherwise we're all going to become, you know...

JIM SINCLAIR: They're never going to change us.
