Rae has been involved with Community Schools and the Community School concept for the past eight years. She has been both a parent and chairperson at Kitchener Community School in Regina. Currently she is the Kitchener Community School Coordinator. On a provincial level, Rae has been involved with the Saskatchewan Community Schools Association for the past three years and now holds the office of Vice President.

Mrs. Pelletier's presentation will focus on her perspective of the Community School Program from the various roles she has played: parent, local Chairperson, Community School Coordinator and provincial Vice President of the Saskatchewan Community Schools Association.

Richard attended school in Regina and studied Administration at the University of Regina from 1969 through 1973. He has worked in Northern Saskatchewan as an adult educator and has been involved in Indian and Metis education through several volunteer committees including: AWASIS – the STF Special Subject Council, the Saskatchewan Community Schools Association (SCSA), and IMEAC –

the Indian and Metis Education Advisory Committee.

Richard has worked in community schools since the Program began in 1980. In his presentation Rick will share his views on the Community School Program's strengths and weaknesses. He will have particular focus on the practical "nuts and bolts" issues of Community School Program implementation.

In 1977 Anne initiated the Early Learning Centre. She is presently the Executive Director of the Early Learning Centre and acquired a BSW in 1985.

Anne has three sons and one daughter. Her hobbies are: Reading and painting in oils.

The workshop will describe the history, goals and programmes of the Early Learning Centre, focusing on the value of community-based efforts to create change. A video tape will be used to illustrate these topics.

In September 1990, Pat became the Executive Director of the MacKenzie Infant Care Centre in Regina. The MacKenzie Infant Care Centre is a day care designed to teach parenting skills to teenage parents, and to provide educational day care for infants from birth to 18 months.

In her presentation, Pat will outline the programs offered at the MacKenzie Infant Care Centre. She will then provide an overview of infant stimulation in the areas of fine motor, gross motor, language and social development skills.

The discussion will also briefly touch upon the developmental tasks of adolescence and how these relate to the skills required for parenting.

In her current position as the Parenting Curriculum Developer at Scott Collegiate in Regina, Mary will begin her presentation with an overview of the Collegiate and its Infant Care Centre. She will describe and discuss support for teen parents. Her presentation will include a video, parenting curriculum and the "Nobody's Perfect Parenting Program".

5. ORAL HISTORY WORKSHOP

(i) Mr. Tom Roberts, Host of Keewatin Kountry CBC Radio La Ronge, Saskatchewan S0J 1L0

Mr. Tom Roberts is the Host of Keewatin Kountry, the CBC current affairs program aired Monday through Friday in Northern Saskatchewan.

Tom has been with the CBC for six and a half out of the last seven and a half years. He left the CBC for a one year period in the mid-1980's to work with Native Communications in LaRonge. Prior to his broadcasting career Mr. Roberts was employed as an Information Officer with the Provincial Government.

Tom Robert's presentation will focus on recording oral history on tape, and in particular talking to Elders about life in the north lands a long time ago.

Tom will give participants counsel on conducting an oral history interview including suggestions on how to approach Elders and how to record them without making them nervous. He will bring sample interviews for participants to hear.

(ii) Keith Goulet, MLA Cumberland House, Saskatchewan

Mr. Goulet, a Metis, born and raised in Cumberland House, is a fluent speaker and writer of Cree. His knowledge of his language has been beneficial throughout his distinguished career.

Keith achieved his Bachelor of Education degree, then went on to receive a Masters of Education in Curriculum. His thesis was an oral history of the Sandy Bay Cree and his presentation will include a discussion on collecting oral history in communities.

Mr. Goulet has been a teacher, consultant, and an administrator. He has worked with both NORTEP and the Gabriel Dumont Institute.

Mr. Goulet is currently a Member of the Legislative Assembly for Cumberland House Constituency.
