Federal Court Affirms Rights of Métis

On January 8, 2013, the Federal Court released its long-awaited decision in Daniels v. Canada. Judge Michael Phelan ruled that the federal government has jurisdiction for Métis under s. 91(24) of the Constitution Act, 1867. S. 91(24) states that Canada has exclusive legislative authority with respect to "Indians, and Lands reserved for the Indians." The ruling thus recognizes Métis and Non-Status First Nations as 'Indians' within the meaning of s. 91(24).

For decades, Canada has only assumed jurisdiction for 'Status Indians' while debate has continued about which government - Ottawa or provinces - is responsible for Métis and Non-Status Indians. As the court noted Canada's own documents admit that Métis are more exposed to discrimination and other social disabilities and that "in the absence of Federal initiative in this field they are the most disadvantaged of all Canadian citizens."

In 1999, Métis leader Harry Daniels and others sought to have the court clarify whether Ottawa or the provinces had jurisdiction for Métis and First Nations living off-reserve. But Canada has strenuously resisted the claim of jurisdiction, first by denying access to its records and then on the grounds that insufficient facts, the difficulty of the case and the definitional difficulties should preclude a remedy being granted by the court. The court rejected Canada's assertions on all of these grounds and held that the Métis have a right to know which government has jurisdiction over them.

The ruling on Daniels v. Canada "should accord a further level of respect and reconciliation by removing the constitutional uncertainty surrounding these groups," writes Judge Phelan. Similarly, Betty Lavallee, the national chief of the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples, said the "case was about fairness, dignity and self-worth."

While Judge Phelan's ruling does not go so far as to declare that the federal government has a fiduciary responsibility to the Métis, it says such duties would flow automatically now that Métis standing has been clarified. Phelan notes that the responsibility "is not an open-ended undefined obligation but must be focused on a specific interest."

That is, the court did not get specific about what the Federal Government should actually do following the court decision. MN-S President Robert Doucette cites post-secondary education thus, "Presently Métis do not have access to the funding First Nations and the Inuit have where they get four years of funding to get an undergrad." He said, "I hope with respect to this ruling Ottawa will extend those obligations to the Métis."

Manitoba Métis Federation President David Chartrand wants to see early childhood education and the health benefits that are provided to onreserve First Nations, extended to the Métis.

Judge Phalen said that the ruling should accord a further level of respect and reconciliation by removing the constitutional uncertainty surrounding these groups. "We are reviewing the court's decision to determine the next steps," said Jan O'Driscoll, spokesman for Aboriginal Affairs and Northern **Development Canada Minister** John Duncan. "Our government continues to work in partnership with all Aboriginals across Canada to address shared priorities such as education and economic development."

Whatever action the Federal Government decides to take, President Doucette said "I hope the Federal Government does not appeal this court ruling."



This month, many people across Métis Nation, First Nations Communities and indeed Canada celebrated the Federal Court landmark ruling in Daniels versus Canada. Judge Michael Phelan declared that the federal government has jurisdiction for Métis and Non-Status Indians. The ruling, according to the Métis Nation of Ontario President Gary Lipinski, "is part of what Métis people have been fighting for since Louis Riel. By acknowledging that the federal government is indeed responsible for the Métis, we are that much closer to finding our rightful place within the Canadian Federation."

The case, Daniels v. Canada, was filed by Harry Daniels and the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples (CAP). This article briefly examines the life and times of Harry Daniels, a Saskatchewan native and proud Métis citizen. Born in Regina in 1940, Daniels got his undergraduate degree from the University of Saskatchewan (U of S), a master's degree from Carleton University, and a honourary doctorate in Law from the University of Ottawa.

Daniels was one of the founding members of the Saskatchewan Métis Society. He served as native peoples organizer in the North West Territories, coordinator of Field Operations for the Métis Nation of Alberta, and as chairman of the Métis and Non-Status Crime and Justice Commission. Daniels also taught Métis History at the U of S.

At the Constitutional talks in Ottawa in the late 1970's, the Native Council of Canada had two seats. First Nations women formally requested a seat at the table, a request that was turned down by the federal government.

Daniels then gave up one of the seats to the First Nations women, thus giving the women a voice at the table.

Daniels held a number of elected positions including Vice President of the Métis Association of Alberta, President of the Native Council of Canada and its successor, the CAP; and President of the Métis National Council.

Thus the ground breaking court ruling in Daniels v. Canada nine years after Daniels' death in 2004 is a culmination of a lifetime of work by Harry Daniels and others and his struggle for social justice for Métis peoples.

IT Update

Website

In December 2012, the website received over 64,000 page hits (revised to exclude the news feeds). The highest activity was experienced on the Home Page, Apply to DTI, **DTI Programs and Contact Us** pages.

IT Support System

In December 2012, we received 33 new IT requests to the support system, of which 27 of them are completed and closed (81% closure rate). Overall, we closed 19 calls in this period. There are currently 37 open Work Orders.

Sophos Upgrade

After extensive testing, the AntiVirus upgrade to v10 will be rolled out over the coming months, starting with the Saskatoon locations in February. As part of this, we will also be cleaning up the database of all obsolete computers listed. After this is implemented, the web filtering rollout to Saskatoon will also be operational.

Building Relocation

Previously, IT in Regina was housed in the same location as DTI. We have just completed an office move. This means that GDI, GDI

Métis Regional Visits

Each year GDI managers and personnel visit the Métis Nation-Saskatchewan regions to provide information and strengthen the Institute's engagement in the areas. In December 2012, GDI Executive **Director Geordy McCaffrey** and DTI Acting Director

This move presented many challenges, including the lack of an elevator, and the merging of two separate networks; but everything went (reasonably) smoothly. As well as the move, two new programs have led to us doubling the number of computers used in this location.

Management Reporter

GDI is continuing to develop Management Reporter for use in the organization. The system has been tested and checked against Great Plains for the last few months. The next phase of the rollout is due to start with remote links to GDI sites to be tested, starting in Regina over the next month.

Shared Address Book

We are also working on a shared email address book for the organization. This is using a protocol called Light **Directory Access Protocol** (LDAP), and will be hosted by our mail hosting company Quadrant. This will provide all users with a standardized global address book in all email clients. There will be a facility for us to be able to maintain this ourselves,


ensuring that only current addresses are listed. There is a mapping issue with Thunderbird to resolve and a final updated import to process before we move this to the final stages of testing, and a full rollout.

Email Security

Just another reminder to be wary of clicking links in emails. If anything looks suspicious please do not click the link.

A key of concern is phishing attacks. This is where an email is received asking for personal information, such as passwords, or bank accounts. Delete such emails! Also there are emails from social media life Facebook to befriend or follow you. Often the link attached redirects to another site that is harmful if clicked. For all social media requests, the safest way to confirm them is not from the email link, but from the website itself.

GDI Publishing Incorporates New Technology By David Morin

Being a small department /publishing office, it is often challenging to promote our resources as much as we'd like. To get some help doing this, GDI Publishing has decided to make our books available on *amazon.ca*. We anticipate that people who don't know about the Institute will be able to find our books on the Amazon site via general Internet searches.

Since joining the site in January 2012, we've received 80 orders with a total of 95 books being sold amounting to over \$3,000 in sales. In addition to the sales, the efficient work of Ryan Nordmarken and the quality of GDI's resources has garnered 10-five star ratings from customers happy with our items and service.

Comments received include: "Excellent service!" "Great resource, this book is awesome, very simple and detailed ... One of my favorite books. DVD is very good;" and "I am surprised at how prompt this was shipped. Thanks, GDI!"

While the number of orders made through Amazon is comparable to our online shop at *https://shop.gdins.org*, the number of items ordered differs greatly. Since migrating to the new site in July 2011, we've had 109 orders for 704 items, worth over \$12,000 in sales.

Facebook has also been a part of Publishing's promotion strategy. GDI's page is currently up to 160 "likes," which translates to a reach of 43,625 unique people if each person were to comment or like a post. Twenty different communities are represented from Île-à-la-Crosse to Missoula, Montana, and from Vancouver to Montreal.

The majority of our fans come from Saskatoon (47%), Prince Albert (14%) and Regina (9%). Another online project that the the Publishing Department has been able to track is the *Michif Dictionary Android App.* Since its release, it has been downloaded 85 times. Of those 85, there are 57 active installs with 50 from Canada, 5 from USA, and one each from the UK and Korea!

The app is currently in development for Apple platforms, which will see further features and more content, and is slated for release in March 2013. All the new features and content will be added to the Android version as well with the same timetable for release.

GDI Publishing is pleased to incorporate this technology to enhance access to its products. These efforts, together with word of mouth and printed catalogue promotion, help to keep up the public profile of our

available resources.

Occupational Health and Safety Program Update

With recent changes in the Saskatchewan Occupational Health and Safety Act, DTI's Occupational Health and Safety Practitioner (OH&S) students are definitely at the forefront of change. DTI OH&S students are entering an emerging career, and to this end, emerging from their recent practicum placements having graduated from the OH&S program with a new appreciation for the world of safety in the workplace.

Fieldwork and practicum experience are not new to programs at DTI; it seems almost weekly that DTI has a a new group of students entering a hospital, or working with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure to develop the practical skills they had learned in class. With the OH&S practicum however, things were a tiny bit different.

To give the OH&S students the opportunity to gather information and experience from the greatest number of industries possible, a wide range of employers were chosen for students to complete their week-long practicum placements. Eight students were placed across

seven separate industries, some over 1,000 km apart. The industries included oil & gas, milling, manufacturing, agriculture, healthcare, construction, and mining.

Each student in the program was paired with at least one safety mentor and learned the industry safety systems. While one student was investigating hardhat violations on the top floor of a commercial tower in Saskatoon, another was some 2,100 feet underground, conducting

safety meeting and ensuring that employees were adhering to the company's 5-point safety system. And while one student was examining confined-space entry tickets conducted a company and monitoring air quality control, another was performing a safety watch... in a 780,000 square foot manufacturing plant... on 152 acres of land.

Depending on the practicum setting, students

In addition, the meetings

were afforded different levels of interaction with employees, committees, and contractors. Each student gave presentation to his or her employer, safety meeting, or assisted in the design of safety manual that would be used by the company. Students were able to catalogue incident reports and investigations, be actively involved in the screening of safety equipment and their observations to their

practicum supervisors. In the end, students gathered for a joint graduation and workplacement celebration. They got the opportunity to present to each other and guests, all that they had learned, witnessed, and done while on practicum.

The students realized that what they had learned in class was only a step in lifelong learning, and more importantly, theory is one thing, but the practical application of what you have learned is definitely
