Welcome and greetings to all participants attending the conference. The Métis Nation of Saskatchewan is very proud to host this important event. Throughout the history of our people, there has always been a recognition that a strong economic base binds our people together, and creates a dynamic, vibrant culture.

In Saskatchewan, Métis people have called upon their leaders to ensure that language, culture and the Métis way of life are protected and allowed to flourish in today's society. As a Nation, we are proud of our history, of the tenacity of our people, and of the vision that we all hold for the future. The MNS has been proactive in seeking Métis self-governance in order to answer the call of its people. One of the keys to self-governance, is having a strong economic base within Métis communities.

Métis people have been working hard to develop initiatives that will empower them to be heard with a loud voice in political decision-making and policy-setting in the province. MNS Affiliates SNEDCO and CCDF have operated successfully in assisting Métis entrepreneurs to develop their businesses. Powerful partnerships have also been established within the MNS through our Intergovernmental Affairs Ministry. The Tripartite Process has a well developed Subcommittee comprised of representatives from the MNS, the Northern Project, Métis Women of Saskatchewan, Aboriginal Business Canada, Western Economic Diversification and Sask Economic and Cooperative Development. Since the establishment of this Subcommittee, other partners such as Saskatchewan's Northern Affairs, Saskatchewan Agriculture and Food, and Canada's PFRA have requested to come on board. Our partners have seen the Métis drive to become self-sufficient and have expressed a willingness to assist in this growth.

A two year work plan has been developed under the Tripartite and Bilateral Processes that outline specific ventures identified as being critical to our Nation's development. Economic development initiatives in tourism and forestry are at the forefront of these ventures. Under WEPA, Canada and Saskatchewan have contributed 40 million dollars to assist in economic development in Western Canada. Both levels of government expect the MNS to be a leader in acquiring a portion of this resource through MNS proposals that are currently being developed.

In January 1999, The Government of Canada commented on the progress of *Gathering Strength - Canada's Aboriginal Action Plan*. Minister Jane Stewart is quoted as saying, "We will work to ensure that Aboriginal people have the skills and expertise to shape their own solutions. The vision we see is sustainable and accountable Aboriginal governments, leading healthy, self-sufficient and economically-viable communities."

With current Aboriginal population trends, The Métis Nation of Saskatchewan has worked diligently to develop strategies that address the protection of land and resource use, the needs of rural and urban Métis people, and build a strong economic base for the generations of the future. The Métis Economic Development Conference provides a forum for you to show your interest and belief in the importance of new initiatives for Métis people in this province. The MNS encourages you develop entrepreneurial businesses, partnerships, and your own vision for the successful development of your communities. See the possibilities, believe in yourself, and work toward a proud strong self-sufficient Métis Nation.





The election will be held, during a General Assembly of the Metis National Council, March 26, 1999, in conjunction with a National

TORONTO-Metis from across the Homeland will gather to discuss the many challenges facing the over half a million citizens of the Metis Nation. There will be a "National Metis Rights Conference" held on March 27 - 28, 1999, in Toronto. A number of fundamental issues will be raised and they include; Hunting and Fishing rights, Health, Housing crisis, Present Land Claims Cases, The right-

ful place of Louis Riel in the history of Canada and the Federal Liberal Party Private Members Bill currently before Parliament, Section 91/24 and Constitutional issues, and the United Nations Draft Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.




