Tips on How to Be Effective at Work and at Home

Due to the broad concept of effectiveness, I have decided to split this topic into two-part article. The second part will appear in the June 2016 Communicator.

Do you consider yourself to be effective at work? Although many of us like to think that we're 100 percent effective, the truth is that most of us have strengths and weaknesses that impact our effectiveness.

All of us could benefit from tweaking at least a few of our skills, in order to become even more effective at work and in our home lives. For instance, perhaps you've always excelled at time management, but how much time do you put into learning new skills, or staying on top of the trends in your functional area? Or, maybe you are adept at managing the considerable demands you face daily in your job. But, when things get really hectic, your communication skills start to suffer as stress levels begin to rise.

Being effective at work can pay off now and throughout our professional careers. Effective workers get exciting projects, achieve important results, and are respected by their colleagues and bosses. But how can you become more effective? What should you focus on? This article examines strategies for

improving your effectiveness at home and in the workplace.

Identify Priorities

If someone asked you what your job was about, would you have a good answer? One of the most crucial steps in becoming effective at your job and in your life is to know your purpose. After all, if you don't know what your job is, how can you set appropriate priorities? If you don't set priorities, you'll be forever buried under a mountain of work, unable to tell the difference between what's important, and what isn't.

To identify your job's true purpose and define what you need to achieve in your current position, do a quick job analysis. This will help you identify the tasks you perform currently, and enable you to uncover the key objectives in your particular job, so that you can start prioritizing tasks effectively. It's crucial to understand that in order to accurately determine what your job consists of, to consult with your immediate supervisor because most misunderstanding about job duties and expectations are due to miscommunication.

Have a Good Attitude

Effective workers have a "good attitude." But what does that really mean?

People with a good attitude take the initiative whenever they can. They willingly help a colleague in need, they pick up the slack when someone is off sick, and they make sure that their work is done to the highest standards. "Good enough" is never quite good enough for them!

A good attitude at work will do more than just earn you respect. Setting standards for your work and your behavior means that you're taking responsibility for yourself, being accountable for what you do. This admirable trait is valued in all organizations including GDI. Demonstrating ethical decision-making, professionalism, and integrity could open many doors for you. So, focus on adopting a good attitude at work, and make decisions that intuitively "ring true." At the very least, you'll sleep easier at night!

Build Essential Skills

Chances are that in your job you have a lot of competing demands on your time. One of the best ways of becoming more effective at work is to learn how to manage your time more efficiently. Time management enables you to prioritize in the face of competing demands. Other key areas include learning how to manage the stress of your position, improving your communication skills, and taking action on career development.

“DTI Led Me on A Great Road to Success”

Sharon Robinson is a student in the Dumont Technical Institute Office Administration Program. She submitted the following article on her experience at Dumont Technical Institute.

In the summer of 2012, I was sitting with my daughter, Aliyah, thinking about what I should do with my life. I wanted to go back to school to finish my Grade 12 so I could make a better life for us. My mom had told me about Gabriel Dumont Institute and that I should apply because it was a Metis school, and also because it was for adults. I loved that idea because I felt too “old” to go back to high school. So I went and applied.

Not even two weeks later, I got a letter asking me to come in for an interview. I searched high and low and finally found a daycare for my daughter. I was ready to start school. In September 2012, I started Adult Basic Education Level

Three program at Dumont Technical Institute. It was a great experience and I learned a lot about my Metis culture. In June 2013, I completed the program, and was registered for Level Four (Grade 12) in the fall. The instructors at Dumont Technical Institute (Danette, Cindy, Janelle, and Bryan) were awesome. They always made me feel welcome and kept me coming to school even though I was faced with multiple struggles during those years. After successfully completing the Level Four program in June of 2014, I decided to take a bit of time off to figure out what I was going to do next.

On February 14, 2015 I found out I was pregnant with my second child. I thought I would wait until the time was right to go back to school. But on September 3, only six weeks from my due date, I got a call from Tracy LaPrise, Dumont Technical Institute Program

Coordinator, saying there was a spot open in the Office Administration Program

I knew instantly that I wanted to accept, but I was so nervous as to what my family would think. I told Tracy I wanted to join the class but there was one small problem... I was eight months pregnant. She assured me that we would take it one day at a time, and encouraged me that I could do it! I had so much running through my head; no one believed I could do it.

On October 3, 2015, I was blessed with a beautiful baby girl named Samira. I was back to school on October 5 to write a final exam. With the amount of support I received from Tracy, Office Administration instructors Elizabeth Majocho and Lindsay Blair, and all of my class mates, coming to school every day was a gift. I did everything I could to succeed, and to prove anything is possible if you put your mind to it.

ABE Student Pays Tribute to La Loche

This is the last instalment of the articles by Adult Basic Education Level 3 students in La Loche. The articles appeared in the GDI Communicator in April. The article by Deanna R. Janvier is among the six that were selected by instructor Jeannie Murray and Dylan Pelletier, a Program Coordinator at Dumont Technical Institute.

I am a resident of La Loche, where I grew up knowing and practicing our Métis traditions and culture. The population La Loche was 2,607 in 2011. We have a number of businesses in town, including four grocery stores. I am a student in the Adult Basic

Education Level 3 program at the Dumont Technical Institute Centre in La Loche.

La Loche has strong Métis cultural traditions, and we were taught how to hunt, fish, and respect our land. Our Elders and parents are also our teachers. The Elders teach us lessons by telling us stories about the olden days when everyone went to church every Sunday and always prayed.

We still pray before going to bed, and we teach these to our children. Some of the stories were about when everyone used to live off the land; and work hard to get what they wanted to keep their families

healthy and fed. We were also taught to hunt and fish only when it is necessary.

Each generation will also go through these important lessons of our cultural values, such as how to respect, love our family and friends and the importance of helping out and giving back to the land. We value these lessons, and live to teach the next generation. We are always reminded to keep our language and speak our language because we were once not allowed to speak it. Parents also teach our young people about the value of education and how important it is now. There is hope for La Loche. 🌐

GDSF Scholarship Golf Tournament A Success

The Fifth Annual Gabriel Dumont Scholarship Foundation (GDSF) Golf Tournament was held on May 27, 2016 at the Moon Lake Golf and Country Club in Saskatoon. The tournament was completely full with 148 golfers.


It was a beautiful day at the golf course, and despite a brief downpour in the afternoon, everyone seemed to be in extremely high spirits. The tournament was a great success raising \$40,095, the highest amount in the annual event. According to Gabriel Dumont Institute Executive Director Geordy McCaffrey,

“This money will go into our scholarship fund where it will be matched with funding from the Provincial Government under the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship to a total of \$80,190.”

Noting that Gabriel Dumont Institute awarded 293 scholarships to Métis students last year, Geordy thanked members of staff who helped or participated in the golf tournament. Scholarship Coordinator Amy Briley stated that the annual tournament has raised a total of \$152,242 to date which, has been marched by the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity

Scholarship to \$304,484. Amy thanked all volunteers, sponsors, and the Government of Saskatchewan for help in enabling many Métis students achieve their academic goals.

In a moving speech, Marsha Janvier, a scholarship recipient from La Loche, spoke about the impact that scholarship funds by Gabriel Dumont Institute have had on her success as a student. Marsha convoked on June 1, 2016 with a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of Saskatchewan. We look forward to another successful tournament next year. 🌐

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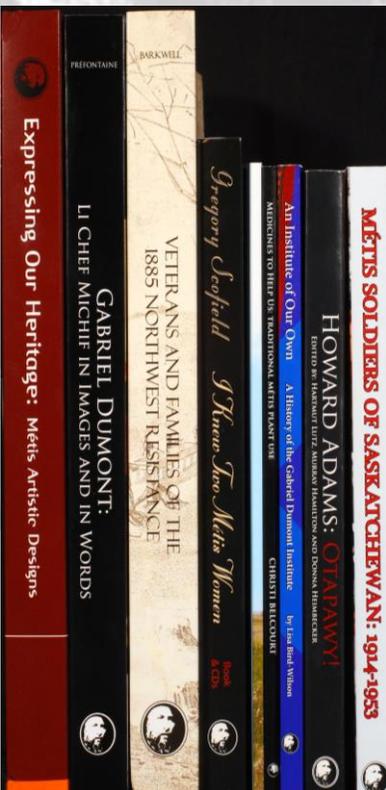
