Ballendine (Ballenden), Samuel. (1834-1903)

Samuel was born at St. Andrews, Red River, the son of George Ballenden and Jane Black¹. He married Flora Chatelain, a member of the Mistawasis Band. Sam worked for the HBC at Fort Carlton, and Fort Edmonton and for the Palliser Expedition in 1857, to 1859. Just before the Métis Resistance of 1885, he was farming instructor on the Sweet Grass Reserve. He also worked for the N.W.M.P. and during the 1885 Resistance he served in the Battleford Home Guards, No. 2 Company. He was the man Crozier sent with a message to Big Bear and Lucky Man to surrender. He died at Bresaylor, Saskatchewan on May 23, 1903.²
