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Travis Sjogren: 'It Doesn't Hurt to Invest in Education'

We recently caught up with Travis Sjogren for a chat about his experience since he first visited the Gabriel Dumont Institute. Travis is a Métis man. He graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the Edwards School of Business at the University of Saskatchewan in 2018.

Travis works as a Financial Advisor at a large financial institution in Saskatoon. "The work experience and knowledge I have gained from my employment has been extremely beneficial toward my personal and professional growth," he says, adding, "I am very passionate about providing customers with advice and solutions to help them become better off financially."

While currently enjoying his job, Travis discussed his future career goals noting, "I aim to continue increasing my knowledge in the banking industry as the sector is constantly changing." He asserts, "With the knowledge gained, I hope to move though different roles so I may put this knowledge to use and assure myself that this is the career path I should pursue. My goal is to one day be an executive at one of the major banks."

Travis first came to Gabriel Dumont Institute during his

second year of university studies following advice by his great-aunt that the Institute provides financial assistance to Métis postsecondary students. Travis was assigned an **Employment Counsellor at Gabriel Dumont Institute** Training & Employment -Randi Ross - who worked closely with him. As he put it, "Randi provided me with guidance in regard to obtaining funding from other sources. Gabriel Dumont Institute pointed me in the right direction and paid for my fourth-year tuition and books."

Asked about his experience with Gabriel Dumont Institute, Travis stated that "I have nothing but excellent things to say about Gabriel Dumont Institute. I had the opportunity of receiving a couple of scholarships from Gabriel Dumont Institute. Gabriel Dumont Institute also funded the last year of my Business School which made my life a whole lot easier and enabled me to concentrate on my studies."

Travis was asked if there is anyone in his life who has inspired him to get to where he is today. He paid tribute to his "family and friends," who "have played an important role in where I am at today. If I had to choose one person it would most certainly be my mother. My mother raised me and taught me everything she knew. She inspired me to better myself through receiving post-secondary education." Travis asserted that "I am truly blessed to have my mother and to draw all my successes from her unconditional love and support."

We asked Travis about the secret to his success despite challenges that he faced as a student. His response was as follows: "All my success stems from my family and friends as they have always been there for me through the good and through the bad." He added, "Throughout my education and career journey, I had the opportunity of meeting someone special who has also been very influential in my success."

That special person is "my girlfriend Colby Chisholm. I am extremely lucky to have her in my life." Travis pointed out that "Colby has been very supportive of my choices and always encourage me to keep working hard for what I want in life. Now that I have completed my schooling and I am currently working, she continues to inspire me to be the best person I can be."

Travis talked about the importance of self-discipline, determination, and resiliency in attaining success in anything one does.

Driver Training Update

Dumont Technical Institute and the Gabriel Dumont Institute Training and Employment have partnered to offer the Class 5 driver training program since May 2017. To date, eight programs have been offered in seven communities across Saskatchewan.

The Class 5 driver training program has been widely successful so far and is in the plans for the future as well. The program itself consists of a classroom portion that allows participants to gain their Class 7 learners license, six hours of required practice driving with a qualified instructor, as well as Class 5 road exams when clients are eligible.

A total of 84 clients have enrolled in the driver training program. Of these, 75 clients have successfully completed the program and received a Class 7 learner's license or a Class 5 driver's license. depending on what each client needs. The Class 5 driver training program is helping remove barriers for our Métis clients, which aids in the process of finding meaningful employment in the future. The Institute continues to see success with programs aimed at empowering clients and is encouraged by the progress made thus far.

There is currently a driver training program in progress in Prince Albert that began in March 2019. The program has 21 clients enrolled and it is anticipated that the clients will complete the necessary in-car driving by mid-May.

Another program is scheduled to begin in Regina in early May. Recruitment has been strong so far and it is expected that the program will be filled by the start of May. We are in the initial stages of planning training at other locations for this coming up year (2019-2020). Currently, the Institute anticipates offering the Class 5 driver training program in three communities.

Overall, there were 44,495 Page Views and 10,125 visitors (76% of these were new visitors) in April 2019. Some highlights of activity are as follows. About 10% of

visitors went to the home page,7.5% (or 759 visitors) clicked on What We Offer, 3.4% (or 344 people) went to the scholarships page, 2.9% (294 people) went to the Training and Employment, and 2.7% (or 273 people) went to the jobs page.

From a demographic point of view, 78% of the visits were from Canadian locations, 11% from the United States, and approximately 1.1% from the United Kingdom, South Africa, and India.

Social Media Summary

The following are some brief stats from our Social Media channels in April.

Facebook: We have broken the 10,000 barrier. The total page likes at the end of April was 10,546. Total Engagements (number of links clicked, likes or comments) in this month was 4,726 over 16 posts. Total reach of posts (number of people who saw a post in their feed) was 75,163 with 13,861 impressions (number of times a GDI page appeared in others' news feeds). The most popular post was the Northern Michif App ("Maarsii, CBC, for making this happen....") with a reach of 10,300, 402 post clicks and 400 Likes, comments and shares.

Twitter: 28 tweets earned 26,300 impressions. There were 19 new followers in the month, 51 mentions, and 813 Profile visits. The top tweet was "Thinking of becoming a teacher" (SUNTEP Regina Open House), earning 4,274 impressions. Top mention was the "I'm so impressed w/ the work these 1st year SUNTEP students produced..." by Brenna Pacholko with 245 engagements. Top media tweet was "We are hiring..." (Faculty recruitment SUNTEP Regina) with 950 impressions. We currently have 1,941 followers.

Phishing/Virus

Just a quick reminder to be vigilant on all emails received. Please be wary of emails asking for account or password information (phishing attacks).

Some of the recent ones appear to be asking you to look at the attached invoice or a payment, with a word document, or a hyperlink in the body of the email. Also, recently seen emails reporting to be from mailserver saying your account is compromised and asking to provide you password.

A couple of tips to identify a phishing email. 1) Look at the from email address. Usually has no reference to the organization it is purported to be from, or will be slightly distorted.

GDI Partners with Corrections Canada to Create Jobs

A Partnership Agreement between Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) and the federal **Correctional Service Canada** (CSC) was initiated in 2018 to help create opportunities for Saskatchewan Métis in the federal public service.

The agreement highlights GDI commitment to providing "financial assistance to a maximum of 10 Métis gualified candidates with training allowances" for **Correctional Training** Program. The training has duration of 12-13 weeks to be The Institute has co-hosted completed in Kingston Ontario. GDI complemented the CSC Correctional Training Program with a 26week wage subsidy to support employment success for Métis candidates. The original MOU has since been expanded to include health related opportunities in the CSC system.

In the summer of 2018, GDI, as represented by Executive **Director Geordy McCaffrey** and GDI Training and **Employment Director Audrey** Hestand, and Correctional Service Canada, represented by Nick Fabiano, Acting

Assistant Commissioner for Human Resources Management, signed a memorandum of understanding aimed at working together to enable Métis individuals gain employment with the CSC.

This month, a top civil servant at CSC. Director General Nathalie Dufresne-Meek, sent a letter to Geordy stating that she looks "forward to continued collaboration in accomplishing our shared goal ... and to hire Métis candidates."

informational recruitment and testing sessions with the CSC across Saskatchewan. The next session will be held at the **Dumont Technical Institute** facility on 1003 – 22nd Street West Saskatoon on May 14th and May 15th between 6:00pm -9:00 pm.

Bill Lehne, an Employment Services Manager at GDI Training and Employment Saskatoon, heads the project. Bill stated that an "internal process to accommodate public inquiries has been developed at the Institute to pre-register clientele and to ensure that GDI is able to accommodate

interested clientele wishing to attend the evening event.' Bill asserted that there is a growing public interest in the partnership with attendance at our information and recruitment sessions across the province growing each time. "This is an exciting career opportunity. It is the first time GDI has gained access to the federal public service commission," he said.

Corey Spence is the first of our clients to complete the program. He was offered employment with the CSC in Prince Albert as soon as he completed his training in March 2019.

Bill noted that the partnership with CSC will create a variety of career opportunities for Métis clients including as correctional officers, parole officers, and health related positions with the federal government. Métis with postsecondary credentials, including those from Dumont **Technical Institute, Gabriel** Dumont College, and the Saskatchewan Urban Native **Teacher Education Program** (SUNTEP), will find more

federal job opportunities.

"I give credit to myself for my willingness to further my education and having the persistence to attain a **Bachelor of Commerce** degree which enabled me to get a job I like."

Towards the end of our conversation, Travis had a word of advice for Indigenous students who may be thinking of post-secondary education after high school. "Please, just do it. You are probably not going to know what you want to do after high school until you give post-secondary a try.

This is an opportunity to find out what you really want to do in life, as well as what you don't like." Travis stated that, "Overall. it doesn't hurt to invest time and money into education as you may find that special something you enjoy doing. It may be easier said than done, but in this day and age, information is easier to access and help can be found through several avenues."

Travis concluded our conversation by thanking "Gabriel **Dumont Institute**

resources I needed to complete the Bachelor of Commerce program offered through the Edwards School of Business."
