The GDI Communicator is an internal newsletter intended to increase communication between management and staff of the Gabriel Dumont Institute of Native Studies and Applied Research

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The Gabriel Dumont Institute received the President's Recognition Award from the Métis National Council (MNC) for 40 years of providing services to Métis Nation citizens in Saskatchewan as well as the rest of the Métis Nation Homeland and the world through its successful education, training, curriculum development, publishing, and cultural initiatives. The President's Recognition Award was presented by the President of the MNC, Clément Chartier in a ceremony at the Bessborough Hotel in Saskatoon in March.

As GDI celebrates its 40th anniversary, we reflect on the Institute's beginnings. Forty years ago, the founders of the Institute built a strong and beautiful vision for Métis education—one that we continue to celebrate today. They built the Institute with a dream to educate and train Métis leaders for the future, to build our capacity for self-government. Over the years, at least eleven thousand Saskatchewan Métis have graduated or been funded through GDI in a wide variety of programs, including Bachelor of Education, education administration, apprenticeship, entrepreneurship, practical nursing, and graduate studies, to name just a few.

The structure and the foundation laid down for us by the Institute's founders provide both security and stability to the Institute. We have continued to build on that strong foundation to create opportunities for Métis students. The Institute delivers programs in more than 15 locations across Saskatchewan and has awarded over \$4.2 million in scholarships to Métis students to date.

We are an employer of choice for Métis professionals across Saskatchewan. We have a workforce of over 210 people whose employment at the Institute supports their families and helps build strong communities. Almost one out of every four (23%) of our employees has been with the Institute for more than 10 years. I think what this boils down to is that people stay where they feel they belong. The number of Institute employees has been increasing by an average of about five percent annually over the past five years, and over the past year, our HR department received 976 job applications from those who would like to work for us. Métis families in Saskatchewan are better off as a result of GDI. The province, and the country, are better off because of GDI.

GDI has proven itself as a leader in Métis education.

Our Métis-specific resources are sought nationally and internationally and our graduates go on to do great things, not only here at home, but around the world. Our gallery, museum, and special collections showcase Métis culture and heritage at its finest. Our virtual museum is second to none.

In the seventies, as the Institute was being negotiated and fought for, it was Jim Sinclair, the then President of the Association of Métis and Non-Status Indians of Saskatchewan (AMNSIS), who carried the vision for GDI. The Institute owes a debt of gratitude to Jim, as a founder, and to all the Métis people at the time, who fought for Métis rights-to the Métis people who blocked roads, attended protests, demonstrated, and occupied the lawn at the Leg. and to the leaders who relentlessly lobbied the government, occupied buildings and government offices, and got the door opened to start the negotiations for the Institute. They stood up for us and they refused to take "no" for an answer. The President's Recognition Award is for the many people who have had a hand in building GDI. Please congratulate yourselves for this award and on behalf of those who helped make the founders' dream a reality. Way to go, Gabriel Dumont Institute.

GDITE and The Changing Labour Market Landscape

We are currently in a time of unprecedented Federal investment in labour market programming and Métis education. A shift in the Government of Canada policy – from rapid reemployment to a greater goal of closing the education, employment, and earning gaps between Métis and non-Indigenous people – has created a significant opportunity for GDI as a whole.

The Institute's ability to create or support meaningful, long-term change in our communities has been unchained from previous restrictions. So what are we

doing at GDI Training and Employment (GDITE) with our newfound freedom?

Our mission has not changed; we are still focused on expanding the possibilities for Métis clients, while preserving our culture and heritage. We have increased funding to students pursuing post-secondary education and expanded wage subsidy programming to create more jobs for Métis. Further, we are now able to continue to support Métis business owners through those tough first years.

In early March, I spoke at the Métis Economic Development

Conference, Building Wealth for the Métis Nation, as part of a panel of Indigenous Skills and Employment Training (ISET) Agreement holders. The panel spoke to initiatives underway that would promote Métis economic development and business ownership.

Over the past decade, GDI has supported the advancement of Indigenous apprentices through to Journeyperson certification. But, we didn't want to stop at employment – we insisted on continuing our model of relentless support to empower our Journeyperson clients to become employers themselves.

Gabriel Dumont Institute's Executive Director, Geordy McCaffrey, received the prestigious Order of the Métis Nation award at a ceremony in Saskatoon on March 9, 2020. The Order of the Métis Nation, bestowed by the Métis National Council, is the highest award of honour and recognition that can be conferred upon individuals who have made a significant contribution to the Métis Nation.

Geordy's career at the
Gabriel Dumont Institute
spans 27 years and, in that
time, he has made a
significant mark on Métis
education and heritage in the
province. As the longestserving Executive Director,
Geordy provides
accountable, professional
leadership for the Institute.
Over the past 17 years, under
Geordy's leadership, GDI has

experienced unprecedented stability and growth. Revenues for programs and services have quadrupled, and best of all, student numbers have increased five-hundred percent.

Geordy can be credited with paying special attention to strengthening the Institute's governance, which is representative of the communities and the Métis Nation, while at the same time maintaining the arms-length relationship built-in by the founders of the Institute. Further, Geordy led the Institute in its bid for federal employment and training contracts and established GDI Training & Employment in 2006. His vision and passion for the Institute have resulted in a beautiful new building in Saskatoon which is home to a museum, gallery, and special collections as well as all of the

Saskatoon-based GDI staff. The new building, in its form and function, is the realization of a long-held dream for a Métis Centre of Excellence.

Under Geordy's quiet humble leadership, the Institute has flourished. He has the keen ability to observe, analyze, and act on trends and opportunities while building partnerships and alliances that enhance the Institute's performance. His legacy includes a genderbalanced Métis senior management team and a human resource base of over 200 staff whose families and livelihoods are better off because of GDI.

Geordy's vision for GDI and his passion for the work of the Institute, along with his sense of humour and affable personality, mark him as a truly remarkable Métis leader.

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Collective Bargaining Update

A new collective bargaining agreement (CBA) between GDI and the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union (SGEU) was ratified on February 13, 2020. The CBA covers the period from April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2022, and was a result of extensive negotiations that originally commenced March 23, 2017 with intermittent meetings occurring from that date until the final memorandum of understanding (MOA) was agreed to by both parties on November 26, 2019.

The final draft of this MOA was delivered to GDI on December 12, 2019 and was

approved by the GDI Board of Governors on December 20, 2019. The next step in the ratification process was for all In-Scope GDI staff members to vote on the agreement. This vote occurred in conjunction with the GDI 40th Anniversary celebrations held February 7 and 8.

On February 13, 2020 GDI was notified the agreement had been ratified by all members. As a result, the new CBA agreement was implemented as soon as confirmation of member ratification was received.

The updated CBA items had a direct effect on all GDI staff due to the commonalities between

CBA and GDI Policy and Procedures. Outlined below is a summary of the substantive changes that affect GDI staff. This listing is not all encompassing but does include some of the major changes:

The most substantive issue that was covered through negotiations was related to monetary issues. In order to maintain a distinct separation between management and in-scope staff, the pay grid increases included in the CBA were applied to all GDI Salary Grids, both in-scope and out-of-scope.

providing some financial reprieve to entrepreneurs just starting the transition of working for someone else, to working for themselves.

into a second phase to
create even more
opportunities for Métis clients
to go full circle from student to
mentor, and from employee to

These increases were approved by the GDI Board in December 2019 and consisted of the following: 0% on April 1, 2016; 0% on April 1, 2017; and 1% increase on April 1, 2018. Further, there were increases of 2% on April 1, 2019; 2% on April 1, 2020; and 2% on April 1, 2021.

An SGEU Observer clause was added to the CBA where GDI agrees to provide the Union with notice of the time and place of assessment of applications and interviews for any position for which there are any internal applicants. Under this clause, SGEU is entitled to have a representative present to function as an observer

during these assessments or interviews.

A volunteer leave clause was added to the CBA where employees have the ability to apply to their supervisor requesting time off with pay of up to eight hours per fiscal year to volunteer with a community based organization.

Under the terms of the old CBA, GDI provided an "advance" of up to five sick days in the event an employee became ill and did not have sufficient sick accrual to cover these absences. Under the new CBA, the number of "advance" days has been reduced from five days to two days.

Also, in the new CBA, GDI has agreed to the SGEU conducting a biennial (once every two years) of their members in regards to the performance of the Institute's management staff. Upon completion of the survey, SGEU has agreed to share that information with GDI.

In closing, the representatives of both the Institute and the Union worked in collaboration to ensure an agreement was provided that effectively balanced the cultural and financial needs of both the Institute and its staff. The Institute looks forward to continuing this partnership through to April 2022 into the next round of bargaining.
