because we are having a feast.




I am going to visit my grandfather. He is going hunting. He has a gun.

Where is sister?




Sister!

Father chops the wood.




Where is the cat?

My cousins and I set out the food.




We like to eat.

Bannock: Is a traditional Métis bread made from lard and flour. It is still enjoyed today by many Métis people.

Feast: A feast is an organized gathering of family and friends in order to celebrate and visit while enjoying specially prepared food. Sometimes feasts are more casual social gatherings other times they are ceremonial and carefully planned.

Jigging: Is a type of traditional dance done by many Métis people. It is usually danced to fiddle tunes.

Kona: Kona means snow in the Cree language.

About the Story

Join a Métis family gathering for a feast as told through the eyes of a young child named Kona. My Family tells about the roles of different family members while they prepare to have the feast. You will meet Kona's grandparents, parents, siblings, uncles, aunts and cousins as they each get ready for the family gathering.

This book is ideal for grades K-3.
