Z is for Zest

The Métis people's zest for life is displayed by their love of song and dance.

Z si poor chi chiikayhtamihk

Lii Michif kii chiikayhtamwuk chi pimatishichik kaa niimichik pi ka naakamoochik.



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The Métis have always been a social and festive people. They received their strong sense of family and community from all their ancestors. All these ancestors provided the Métis with a love of song and dance and their "joie de vivre" or "joy of life." The Métis blended these **traditions** into very unique music and dance styles.

The Métis' favourite musical instrument is the fiddle. They quickly adapted Scottish and French-Canadian playing styles, creating their own rhythms and songs. From this new style emerged such tunes as the "Red River Jig" and "Drops of Brandy." These new songs led to the creation of new dances too. The Métis took the Scottish jig, First Nations step-dancing, and French-Canadian square dancing to create a unique dancing style. Some of the more popular Métis dances include the "Sash Dance" and the "Rabbit Dance."

In the past, Métis celebrations involved a great deal of fiddle playing and dancing. These celebrations often lasted three days or more and went from house to house. Each family welcomed all their guests and fed them. Whatever food was available was shared with the guests. This festive spirit can still be seen at such present-day Métis celebrations as *Back to Batoche*, the *Prince Albert Métis Fall Festival*, *Palmbere Days*, and *The John Arcand Fiddle Fest*. These are good times for the Métis to visit friends and relatives.
