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NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY AT BATOCHE By Karon Shmon, Director of Culture & Heritage

National Indigenous Peoples Day occurs each year on June 21st. It is a day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples.

The day was first proclaimed in 1996 as National Aboriginal Day and was renamed in 2017. Indigenous peoples want to see the recognition and appreciation occur every day <u>and</u> to be formally celebrated each June 21st.

Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) hosted a celebration with our partners, Batoche National Historic Site and Friends of Batoche Historic Site Inc. There was so much to celebrate. Over 300 children were on site learning about the Métis. Other special moments included Donny Parenteau performing and being the MC, opening the formal program with a prayer from Elder Margaret Harrison followed by the Métis and National anthems sung by Angela Rancourt and her students. The Smoking Sage Drummers from One Arrow First Nation provided honour songs for the day. Elders Harriet and Edwin St. Pierre were special guests honouring veterans and the Michif language.

Donny continued to entertain those on site and one segment included Kate Boyer sharing her jigging skills. A very special moment was the unveiling of a plaque of Gregory Scofield's poem, *The Sewing Circle*, in Michif.

RELLAND RETIRES AFTER 31 YEARS

As the academic year came to a close this June, Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) students, staff, and faculty said goodbye to long-serving employee Michael Relland. A celebration took place on June 10th in Prince Albert to honor Mike's long, remarkable career at the Institute.

Mike started at GDI in 1990 as a faculty member for Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) in Prince Albert. Within a couple of years, he became the Program Coordinator/Program Head.

Mike built his career and made his mark running the SUNTEP centre in Prince Albert for many years. His easy-going nature, humility, as well as care and concern for his students are a few of the qualities that have set Mike apart in his career. Over the years, he has nurtured successive groups of SUNTEP teachers who have gone on to do important work in schools across the province.

Mike was instrumental in the development of Gabriel Dumont College's (GDC) Community-Based Master of Education Program (CBMEP) in Prince Albert, which began in 2013. GDC is another entity within GDI that offers accredited undergraduate and graduate education to Métis students. In 2018, Mike moved to the Gabriel Dumont College (GDC) to continue his great work with the Masters program.

Mike's ability to build and grow partnerships within the community directly impacted the success of the Master's program. In 2020, a second CBMEP was launched in La Ronge. To date, GDI has graduated 124 Master's students and the program continues to attract new students. It takes vision and determination to initiate these opportunities and pursue them to fruition; and GDI is glad to have Mike's experience and wisdom to guide the development of an new graduate programs currently in the works. These are tremendous accomplishments that would not have been possible without Mike's hard work.

Mike's accomplishments within his years of service at GDI are many. A few that are most notable is the partnership he worked on with the Saskatchewan Rivers School Division, which brings university credits into the high schools helping build the confidence of grade 12 students who might not otherwise pursue post-secondary education. He also worked on various research articles on Métis education.

One of his most recent articles in collaboration with Dr. James Oloo, titled, "'I Think of my Classroom as Place for Healing': Experiences of Indigenous Students in a Community-Based Master of Education Program in Saskatchewan" was published in the Canadian Journal of Educational Administration and Policy last fall.

"Many names and faces come to mind wherever the story of GDI is told. However, very few are as closely tied to the Institute's teacher education program as Michael Relland's. Mike prioritizes the student over the curriculum and is intentional in building healthy relationships with his students.

It was translated by Elder Sophie McDougall who was present to unveil the plaque with Gregory. This plaque stands beside the French and English versions that put "poetry in place" through the Project Bookmark Canada program. The poem imagines the experiences and conversations that went on among the women of Batoche in 1885, all around the nonthreatening sewing circle.

Visitors also had the opportunity to tour the site and to view the rug exhibition created in partnership by Gabriel Dumont Local 11, Friends of Batoche, and the Gabriel Dumont Institute. It features many of the rugs made by Elder Margaret Harrison and contemporary rugs made by others following workshops through which she imparted her rug hooking skills.

Further from the visitor center, students enjoyed the mini voyageur games and a taste of bannock and jam in addition to tours of the historic church, rectory, cemetery, and Caron Home; places of great importance in telling the story of the Métis.

National Indigenous Peoples Day is always one filled with reverence and with joy. We revere the strength and endurance of those became before us and we joyously celebrate the success of their struggles by the very fact that we are still here and thriving.

Of course this was easy to acknowledge over a bowl of bison stew, accompanied by bannock and Saskatoon berry tarts, while listening to fiddle music with old friends and as we made new ones.

A personal highlight for me was to see the GDI summer students and other GDI staff come to Batoche to celebrate National Indigenous Peoples Day.

COVID-19 UPDATE - JUNE 2022

As a result of the continually changing landscape regarding the pandemic, GDI has updated its COVID-19 Response Plan accordingly. As always, GDI's priority remains the health, safety, and well being of our students, faculty, and staff.

<u>Masks</u>

Beginning July 4, 2022, and continuing until August 31, 2022, GDI facilities will be pausing the mandatory mask protocol and will be moving to a mask friendly environment. While masks will no longer be required in any GDI locations, they will be encouraged and welcomed in all areas of our facilities and locations. Masks will continue to be provided for all staff, students, and visitors that choose to wear them.

Vaccination and Testing

Due to the program brokering arrangements of GDI, brokered programs will follow the guidelines as determined by the accrediting institution. GDI's response will be tailored to the accrediting institution and the best needs of each particular program and community in question.

For all staff, continued voluntary testing at home will help prevent asymptomatic transmission and will reduce COVID-19 transmission in our community. In order to keep GDI facilities and campuses safe, GDI is strongly encouraging everyone to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19, including taking advantage of free rapid testing, regular handwashing, staying home when ill, and obtaining your full vaccination and booster dose.

Staff Gatherings

Essential work-related staff gatherings are permitted. However, shared meals and potluck are not recommended at this time.

Over the course of the summer, GDI's pandemic response team will closely monitor the case numbers along with the public health data and recommendations to determine the level of health and safety measures necessary to ensure the ongoing safety of our students, faculty, staff, and visitors. These measures will be re-evaluated prior to August 31, 2022. ©
