Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) strives to be a space where everyone feels welcome and safe to express themselves. A second year SUNTEP student passionately expressed,

Many students highlight how they grow culturally, and gain a stronger identity throughout their four years in the program. To encourage growth, SUNTEP continues to evolve, reflecting the needs of the community, schools, and student body it serves.

With that, SUNTEP Prince Albert students participated in a two-part

workshop about diversity and inclusion, specifically addressing safe spaces and 2SLBGTQ+ challenges in education. Fourteen students from the SUNTEP Culture Committee, along with SUNTEP faculty, gathered with SUNTEP Saskatoon, Indian Teacher Education Program, University of Saskatchewan, Elders, and Knowledge Keepers from across Saskatchewan to learn how to make education more inclusive. Presentations took place at the SUNTEP center in Prince Albert.

Two 2Spirit Elders, Marie (Jojo)
Sutherland and Majorie Beaucage,
shared stories and teachings. Elder Liz
Settee provided a smudge and prayer
and reminded us all that each
individual will have gifts within. From

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GABRIEL DUMONT INSTITUTE NATIONAL MICHIF SPEAKERS GATHERING

The Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) will be hosting a National Michif Speakers Gathering from March 21st-March 23rd, 2023 in Saskatoon. The theme of the conference is "Michif is a Beautiful Language."

The conference will bring speakers together to learn about the promising practices and initiatives individuals and groups are using to revitalize each of the three Michif languages spoken across the homeland. The speakers will also help this process by contributing to language banking activities for each Michif language. Michif is critically endangered and at

great risk. The majority of fluent speakers are elderly. Over two thirds of these knowledge keepers have passed on over the last 15 years. One part of the legacy of these precious knowledge keepers will be the language recordings they leave us with so Michif can be reclaimed and spoken across generations.

The gathering is by invitation only as we focus on inviting the speakers. If there is room for external registrants, the process and registration fee will be announced via the Institute's social media channels once this is determined.

DTI HEALTH CARE TRAINING UPCOMING PROGRAM EXPANSIONS

On January 31, 2023, the Saskatchewan Ministry of Advanced Education announced an immediate initial investment of more than \$5.5 million to help create over 550 new post-secondary training seats across 18 health care training programs.

As part of this announcement, Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) will receive additional funding for program expansions starting in 2023-24. This expansion includes 28 combined additional seats for DTI's Continuing Care Assistant program and Practical Nursing program.

"This Government of Saskatchewan investment will ensure the Institute can expand our health-related programming to Métis students specifically. As the second largest Practical Nursing provider in Saskatchewan, we must continue to train Métis students at the community level, contributing to a more diverse, culturally-sensitive

healthcare workforce," said Tim Roussin, Chair GDI Board of Governors.

DTI is now recruiting for the additional program seats! The new Practical Nursing (two-year diploma program) cohort will start in September 2023 in Prince Albert, and the new Continuing Care Assistant (one-year certificate program) cohort will begin in September 2023 in Prince Albert as well. Under the province's Health Human Resources Action Plan launched in September 2022, this expansion will work to stabilize and grow the health care workforce in Saskatchewan. PAYING IT FORWARD - RIBBON SKIRTS FOR THE KIDS

In Fall of 2022, the Metis Nation – Saskatchewan (MN-S) announced a collaboration with various school divisions across Saskatchewan; a collaboration to bring Michif and Dene to young learners. In partnership with the Northern Lights School Division, MN-S introduced a Cree language course to the Pre-K and Kindergarten students at Pre-Cam School in La Ronge. We, as a community, are fortunate to be a part of this partnership.

More recently, Northern
Saskatchewan Indigenous Teacher
Education Program (NSITEP) Faculty
member, Nancy Lafleur (also owner
of Cree8tive Cree-ations), made an
amazing, one of a kind donation of
10 ribbon skirts to our school. The
donation showed appreciation to
the Northern Lights School Division
for supporting the NSITEP program
and was an opportunity for students
to practice what they are learning in
the classroom.

Nancy creates amazing story skirts. If you have ever had the chance to

see one, you know you are in the presence of a master craftsperson. She tells stories through intricate images sewn onto panels of the skirts. Her inspiration come from a multitude of places, including dreams, conversation, nature, or just an idea of how different fabrics, textures, and threads might look; from there, wearable pieces of art are brought to life.

These skirts are a class set, which students will be able to wear during special events. The pride in having access to the ribbon skirts was evident in the students smiles and how quickly they chose their favorite skirt.

In addition, we are lucky to have a recent Community-Based Master of Education Program graduate, Abby McLeod, teaching the Pre-K students. She is passing on valuable knowledge, with respect to the Cree language. Beyond teaching about the Cree people, Abby also shares local history and history of the Métis people, as we are located on the homeland of the Métis.

SECOND MÉTIS VETERAN'S MONUMENT ENGRAVING

The Monument, installed at Batoche, was first engraved with 5, 418 names of veterans' when it was unveiled in 2014. In October 2022, a second engraving added 307 names to the monument. To date, there are a total of 5, 725 names engraved. The monument serves to honour and pay respects to Métis servicepeople.

GDI is continually collecting names for future engravings. If you would like to honour a past or present veteran, contact Gabriel Dumont Institute at veterans@gdins.org with information such as their name, service number and dates, and how they were involved.


