The awards ceremony celebrated all five Métis women: Grace Zoldy (Gold), Christi Belcourt (Gold), Irma Klyne (Gold), Evelyn Johnston (Silver), Patricia LaFontaine (Silver), for their contribution to the Métis community. The ceremony opened with a prayer from Elder and Senator Nora Cummings. An Elder's prayer is our traditional way of starting a gathering in a good way. It sets the tone for the gathering, often asking the Creator for help and guidance and calling on all of us to work together for the betterment of our people. Senator Cummings extoled the

contributions of the recipients and reminded all of us in attendance of the significant role that GDI has in clearing the path and nurturing what people have to offer in our community through their hard work and dedication.

Each recipient's biography was a testament to the significant impact each has made, and continues to make. Each humbly accepted their award noting the help and support they had received from others — our traditional value of sharing the credit for what we accomplish together, even when one is the leader or catalyst.

The feeling of pride in the room was palpable and each recipient received a standing ovation.

CONNECTING TO CULTURE ONE THREAD AT A TIME

January seemed the perfect time to delve into our Métis past and embrace our cultural connections. The role and impact of the ribbon skirt in showcasing our history and roots has been lost to some. Office Administration Regina students fully embraced learning about how the Métis highlighted their identities through our clothing. Elders Gail Witherspoon and Sandy Briere joined us for a three-day event to discuss our past, and to provide instruction on how the garment is constructed and how to sew a straight line. Students chose their material. ribbons, and styles that embraced and connected them through patterns and colours to their cultural roots.

Métis Nation-Saskatchewan Western Region III provided the use of their social room as our sewing center. Elder Gail (GG) provided 13 pre-threaded sewing machines, so the students were all set to go on the first day. We started the first morning with the students collecting their material, finding a seat with GG, who showed us how we would construct our pieces of clothing. whether skirts or shirts and talking about the fabric and how we would handle it. Then we reviewed the sewing machines, its components, the different items at each student's station, which ranged from pins to measuring tape to scissors.

We discussed the importance of how clothing is connected to our culture, discussing the relationship that Métis people have with using clothing to represent our culture, including ribbon skirts and shirts. With the Elders, we could share books, ideas, historical pictures, and family stories from times past. This helped the students understand that, YES, Métis women wore ribbon skirts. While the skirts have evolved since the 1800s, at their

roots, they remain the same, providing us with the opportunity to express our connections to the land, to our culture, and to ourselves of who we are. Being able to share the importance of our culture with one another helps to bridge the disconnect that many feel about our culture.

By the end of the second and third days, students were confident in their journeys with their creations. They helped each other pin, measure, cut and sew their different items and building that community bond to greater levels. Students were laughing, sharing stories, and talking about taking this newly gained knowledge home to their families, where, hopefully, they can encourage others to be proud of who they are!

Amanda H. states, "The knowledge that I gained taught me that Métis are more than just sashes and jigging and that your skirt is your story and that every skirt is unique and represents each individual journey."

Sable L. states, "I learned about the meaning of ribbon skirts, who can wear them, and how long our people have been wearing them. We learned how much they have evolved with the styles, patterns, and colours."

Alysha N. states, "It was interesting to find out that this is a part of our Métis history, and it felt great to participate in something that other Métis women before me have done."

Taylor L. states, "I am very grateful that I was given the opportunity to create my own ribbon skirt. Doing it with my class, surrounded by my community, made it even more special. I felt a sense of belonging."

INDIGENOUS POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION FORUM

On February 28, 2024, the Institute hosted a pre-forum social event leading to the 2024 Indigenous Post-Secondary Education (IPSE) Forum. Knowledge Keepers, students, and forum dignitaries gathered in the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) Métis Art Gallery and Museum during this networking event. Many marvelled at the gallery's beauty and enjoyed the fiddle tunes played by Joseph Desjarlais.

The IPSE forum was held on February 29th at Wanusekwin Heritage Park in Saskatoon. GDI co-hosted it with the First Nations University of Canada and the Saskatchewan Indian Institute of Technologies in partnership with the Ministry of Advanced Education. The theme of the in-person forum was holistic wrap-around support for Indigenous students, providing post-secondary institutions the opportunity to share wise practices, network, and foster collaboration to improve Indigenous post-secondary education outcomes.

An important aspect of the forum was the inclusion of Knowledge Keepers,

Grandmothers perspectives, and their actives roles in the discussions during the one-day event. Other highlights included an Indigenous student panel, and several learning and cultural sessions.

"By coming together in forums like this, we can collectively work towards building brighter futures for Indigenous students. It's important that we are here to sit around the table and centre Indigenous voices, perspectives, and knowledge systems," said acting executive director Brett Vandale during his opening remarks at the forum. "I hope we can create educational experiences that honour diversity, promote equity, and empower Indigenous learners to reach their full potential."

Overall, the group gathered key points and actionable recommendations to determine how to move forward with opportunities for meaningful collaboration across the sector to improve Indigenous student outcomes.





2024 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING WELL ATTENDED

In Saskatoon, the Gabriel Dumont Insitute held the 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) on March 22nd, 2024. Elders, community members, past leaders, Métis Nation—Saskatchewan (MN—S) representatives, and GDI staff from across the province came together to review the past year of the Institute's important work.

The meeting began with a prayer from Elder, Senator Nora Cummings, and Amy Briley, GDI Program Coordinator, welcomed guests on behalf of the Institute. MN—S Minister and GDI Board Chair Wendy Gervais, shared her own educational journey with GDI, and her appreciation for the hard work of the Board and staff to keep that journey going for future generations. Finally, Dr. Cheryl Troupe was appointed as the speaker for the meeting, and the AGM began.

Acting Executive Director, Brett Vandale presented the Operations Report for 2022/2023. He began by reminding everyone of the GDI mission that

encompasses all the hopes and dreams of the founders in 1980. The GDI governance structure remains unchanged as the designated education affiliate of the MN—S, GDI has always been its own legal entity with its own bylaws and constitution.

Overall, the report pointed towards the progress made in relation to GDI's 2022—2027 Strategic Plan: *Proud Past, Bright Future,* which drives all the current operations for the Institute.

Beverly Lonsdale, Director of Finance, delivered the Institute's financial report, reviewing the positive growth over the past five years. The Institute remains in a strong financial position thanks to our diversified revenue streams and strong partnerships.


