READING ON THE ROAD: GDI PRESS HOSTS COMMUNITY BOOK READINGS

GDI Press toured some rural Métis communities to celebrate the launch of two new children's books, *Road Allowance Kitten: Full Circle* by Wilfred Burton and *Stinky Sock Jam* by Doris McDougall. Winter is traditionally a time to gather and share stories to pass down histories, cultural teachings, and raise our spirits in the cold dark months. Authors had the chance to read from their books in these Métis communities, which informed the stories, and GDI Press was able to strengthen cultural connections with rural readers.

The first book reading was held Sunday, November 30, 2025, at Trwaa Lee Vyay Cafe in Lebret, Saskatchewan. Wilfred Burton read from *Road Allowance Kitten: Full Circle*, and illustrator Christina Johns was also in attendance. This third installment in the *Road Allowance Kitten* series completes

Rosie, Madeleine, and Kitten's journey back south to live on the Road Allowance near the Fort Qu'Appelle Sanatorium (known as "Fort San"). The first two books in the series have become popular with educators and children alike. This third installment explores a new aspect of Michif life in the early 20th century. GDI Press is grateful for the financial support from SK Arts, Sask Lotteries, and BHP Canada to complete this latest installment.

On Sunday, December 14, 2025, GDI Press visited St. Joseph Seniors Club Bowling & Recreation Hall in St. Louis, Saskatchewan to celebrate the release of *Stinky Sock Jam* by Elder Doris McDougall, with illustrations by Lucille Scott. This was the first time GDI Press has had an author read in the original Michif-French, and the event was well attended with over 40 community members.

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE, REPURPOSE, RECLAIM, REVITALIZE

Although Earth Day occurs every April, every day was earth day for our ancestors. We are now seeing a shift back to land-based learning as the impact of global warming and our desire to reclaim our cultural values both increase. We can be proud that the environmental footprint left by the Métis on the road allowances was minimal because those who lived on them were in tune with sustainable harvesting practices and protocols and our long-held value to avoid making waste. Even looking back as far as the bison hunt, we can see that every part of the bison was utilized, a value that went hand-in-hand with the value to share and to ensure everyone in the community was looked after.

After the 1885 Resistance, our people were forced to relocate and start over. This, coupled with the disdain that resulted from the one-sided account of what the victors called a rebellion, meant many Métis experienced subsistence living for generations afterwards. Fortunately, the value to avoid making waste remained. This was important during the rough times when our people did so out of necessity. Besides the value to make something from what was available, we also valued making it aesthetically pleasing, or beautiful. In combination, our ancestors were proud of these two values. They made the most of things and they did so with creativity and style.

We are primarily aware of this because of the material culture that has withstood the test of time. I marvel at the beaded and embroidered items, such as clothing, footwear, household items, and quilts. These were made from what was available and not from what was desired. Today, we can get exactly what we want because we have the means and because there are so many readily available sources. I remain in awe of these gorgeous pieces made by our ancestors while I wonder when they found the time to do this after a hard day's work and conditions that were less than optimal. Catching or growing your food, preserving it, cutting wood for fuel and shelter, making your clothing, and doing laundry by hand are consuming tasks that would leave one with little time or energy. We must keep this in mind as we appreciate the beauty and ingenuity of items literally made from scrap.

While we no longer must be thrifty, we can reclaim the values espoused by those who came before us out of respect for their efforts. It also makes good sense in contemporary times that call for us to be acutely aware of what is harming Mother Earth. Reduce, reuse, recycle, and repurpose aren't new terms. They are reminders of the values and lifestyles of our ancestors, both of which are key components to reclaiming and revitalizing Métis ways of knowing, living, and being. 🌍

"In the lab today, we learned how to insert an IV to provide fluid replacement and medication administration for patients in future practice. This is a very important skill to have as it is very common for hospitalized patients to receive an IV. The lab simulations allow us to practice in a forgiving environment where we are encouraged to make mistakes to help further our learning and practice the skills properly without judgement. Our instructors guide us with their firsthand knowledge of each skill and demonstrate it to us prior to completing the skill while allowing for questions and assistance. This ensures that we are prepared and practicing to the best of our abilities once we are in clinical settings and after we graduate."

FUELING YOUR BUSINESS: FUNDING & GRANT OPPORTUNITIES FOR MÉTIS ENTREPRENEURS

On Thursday January 22nd, 2026, the Clarence Campeau Development Fund (CCDF), Saskatchewan Métis Economic Development Corporation (SMEDCO) and GDITE's Pathways to Entrepreneurship Program co-presented a workshop for Métis entrepreneurs and business owners called "Fueling Your Business: Funding & Grant Opportunities for Métis Entrepreneurs." Participants got a quick overview of some of the supports available to Métis citizens looking to start, expand, or purchase an existing business.

Tracey McMurchy, Kendall Horan, and Ryan Patterson presented on behalf of CCDF and SMEDCO, which used to be separate entities, but they have combined forces to offer a one stop service for Métis entrepreneurs in Saskatchewan. Now Métis Nation—Saskatchewan (MN—S) citizens can access everything they need to get their business idea off the ground. Nicole Denbow presented on behalf of GDITE's Pathways to Entrepreneurship, which offers complimentary support to CCDF and SMEDCO funding programs. These programs help Métis entrepreneurs leverage the existing support available for business owners from the Saskatchewan and federal government.

The first step for any entrepreneur is the business plan. The research and planning that goes into developing a business plan is essential to secure funding. Working with a professional consultant on a business plan can be a completely covered cost for Métis entrepreneurs reducing barriers to launching a successful business. CCDF can offer seventy-five percent funding to develop a business plan up to a maximum of \$10,000, and GDITE

funds the remaining twenty-five percent to work with a business consultant one-on-one. Nicole recommends that you start by applying for the CCDF Business Plan Program before being referred to the GDITE Pathways to Entrepreneurship Program.

Next, entrepreneurs must secure the necessary business loans, grants, and investors to turn their plans operational. CCDF offers interest-free and interest-bearing loans and grants for Métis owned businesses. There are many funding programs that Métis business owners can apply for, but Ryan recommends starting by giving CCDF a call to get personalized recommendations on what programs would be the best fit for your business. Some of the programs include the Métis Entrepreneur Equity Program, Women's Business Development Program, Youth Business Development Program, and the "Ocinâs" (Community) Program to name a few. CCDF and SMEDCO contributions do not replace existing funding options like banks, and a business owner must still have equity of five to ten percent in the business depending on the program.

After your business is open, CCDF, SMEDCO, and GDITE will continue to support Métis business owners to grow and expand their business. Pathways to Entrepreneurship funds training and professional development opportunities that are either related to your industry or support developing your business management skills in general (e.g. bookkeeping). For the skills you can't learn, Métis entrepreneurs can receive GDITE funding to hire professional services like lawyers, certified professional accountants, or other specialized business professionals to reach their business goals.

CCDF also offers professional support through the Management Skills Program and Business Support Program which help clients improve their opportunities for running a successful business. No matter what stage your business is at, there is support available to help Métis businesses grow and thrive.

For all programs, applicants must be a registered MN—S citizen and operating, or planning to operate, a business in Saskatchewan. The business must be at least fifty percent Métis-owned and meet eligibility requirements. For more information, entrepreneurs are encouraged to call a CCDF or GDITE advisor to discuss their business needs and be matched with the program that is best for them.

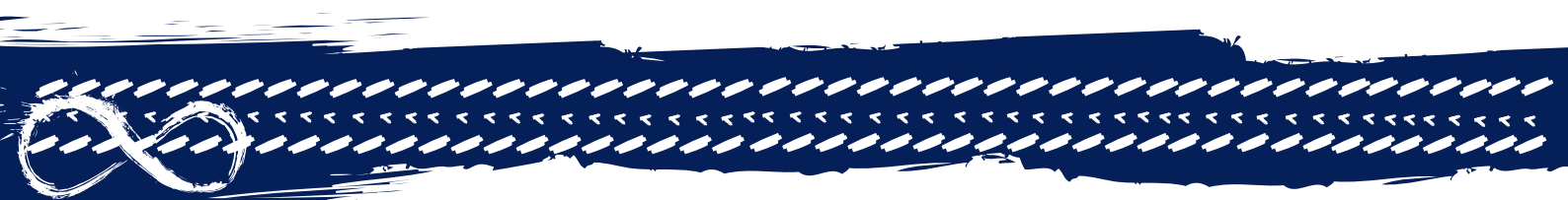
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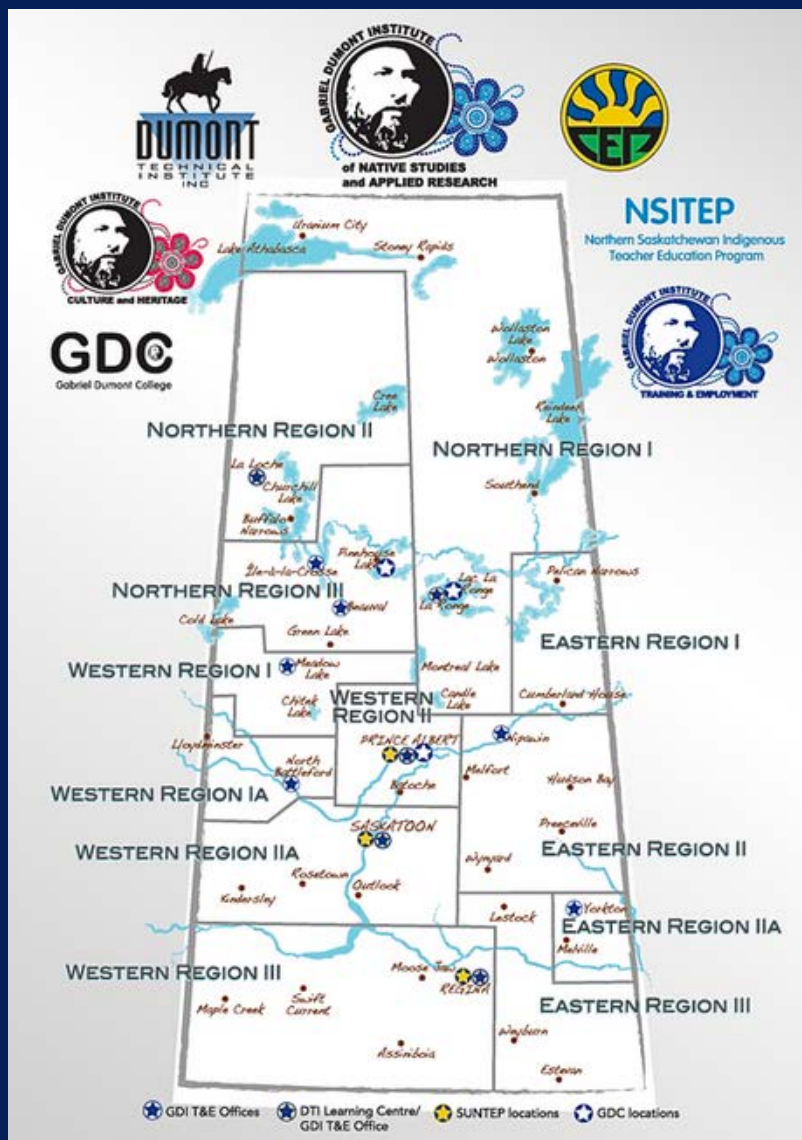
